Three landscapes were among the five most popular images at the Society's first exhibition of prints that formed part of FynArts.

Hundreds of visitors attended the exhibition of 50 images by about 20 photographers, in our regular meeting venue at the Dutch Reformed Church from 9 to 19 June.

Of those attending, 304 voted for their favourite image. The votes were spread widely, and many visitors made positive comments to the supervising Society members.

Ron was a long-standing member of the Society and served on the committee, usually as treasurer, for many years. It started during Faith Botha's tenure as President until the club finally allowed him to withdraw at the end of 2015.

Ron was totally dependable, produced impeccable financial documents for the committee, and was

Ron will be remembered fondly by all who knew him, not least for his witty comments in the background at club meetings. He will be sorely missed.

Workshops on Nik and HDR

Mike Sander will present two sets of workshops - one on using Nik software, in July, and one on the use of HDR techniques, in August.

The Nik Collection is a set of image enhancement tools and photographic filter plug-ins for Adobe Photoshop, Adobe Photoshop Elements, Adobe Lightroom and Apple's Aperture.

It was developed by Nik Software, a company established in 1995 and based in San Diego, California.

The collection was originally priced at \$500, but after Google acquired Nik in 2012, the price was dropped to \$150.

On March 24 this year Google made the entire Nik Collection a free download.

High-dynamic range imaging (HDR) is described as the fastest growing, and perhaps the trendiest new technique in photography. By combining several images with different exposures photographers can capture scenes which are beyond the dynamic range of their camera.

The trick is that HDR scenes not only can't be captured in a single image, they also can't be fully displayed or printed in their native form. That means additional processing is required to turn the photo into one which can be used. (Sources: Wikipedia and Explora)
