#### View from the chair

#### Getting out of the comfort zone

The monthly Set Subject has always been somewhat problematic, despite various attempts to use it to its full potential.

The Set Subject should encourage members to get out of their comfort zone, and take some fresh photographs in a category that they may not be used to.

Or, if the Set Subject falls within their favourite category, to be creative and interpret it in another way, coming up with something completely different.

For example, if the Set Subject is "Local birds", as it was for the April meeting, the birds need not be feathered. They could be lying on the beach or sitting in a restaurant.

The point is that members should not just go through their old photographs to find something that more or less fits the topic.

Furthermore, taking part in the Set Subject should give members the opportunity to discuss these more experimental, creative images that they have produced out of their comfort zone.

In an attempt over the last two years to encourage members to make more of the Set Subject, it has been linked to an outing or workshop on the same topic during the previous month.



This will now be taken a step further, by having a presentation at the monthly meeting – whenever feasible – on a topic related to the Set Subject for the following monthly meeting.

As an example of this procedure, we had a presentation on macro photography by Elizma Fourie at the April meeting. It will be followed by a workshop on the same topic, led by her, on 13 April. And then the Set Subject for the May meeting will be "Close-up", which can be macro photography, but is also open for wider, creative interpretation.

Members present at the April meeting indicated by a clear majority that they prefer voting for and discussing the Set Subject images, rather than having them evaluated formally.

So, let's all get out of our comfort zones.

### Reaching for the stars

One member was promoted from two to three stars, while another two gained a bagful of salon acceptances during the last month.

Ingrid Grundling, needing only one gold award to reach the 10 required for promotion, did well to be awarded three golds at the March meeting.

Promotion does not necessarily make life easier. As a three-star photographer she will now need 25 golds, and 100 points instead of 40, for promotion to the next level.

But with three stars comes the opportunity to advance with salon points as well. Two salon points would reduce the required golds to 15 and the ordinary points to 60.

So, there is an incentive for members to join achievers like Treurnicht du Toit in entering images for salons.

His latest successes are 16 images accepted for exhibition at three international salons,

including one in Donegal and one in Southampton, and nine at three South African salons, including the PSSA National Digital Salon of Photography and the Krugersdorp Camera Club National Digital Salon.

Robert Johnson, a relativerly new but experienced member, was awarded a certificate of merit by the PSSA Salon for his image "Tour guide", while another six of his images were accepted for exhibition by that salon and the Krugersdorp Salon.

**The May meeting**\_will be in the Dutch Reformed Church Hall, as usual, on Wednesday the 3<sup>rd</sup> at 19:00. Members may enter up to three images of their choice for evaluation, and one image on the Set Subject of "Close-up" for discussion.

**The set subject for June** will be "The wheels of time". It will be preceded by a presentation on photographing graphic lines and curves at the April meeting, and an outing to the old car graveyard at the Wijnland Auto Museum in Joostenbergvlakte.

### FynArts 2017, here we come

Hermanus Photographic Society members will exhibit their finest prints as part of the FynArts 2017 festival in June, after the success of last year's exhibition.

The title of the exhibition, "Moments", was chosen to enable all Society members to participate, irrespective of their preferred categories.

The deadline for submitting entries is noon on Monday 8 May. Members may enter up to three images, previously evaluated or not, that were taken during the preceding 12 months. Entries, in digital format, must be emailed to <a href="mailto:cmmaude@gmail.com">cmmaude@gmail.com</a>.

Each entrant will be responsible for having his or her selected images printed and mounted. Prints must be no bigger than A3 and no smaller than A4. The bigger, the better, within these limits.

As last year, participating members will share the costs of the exhibition payable to FynArts, and all members will be asked to volunteer to do a stint as host for the exhibition, in the Hermanus Dutch Refomed Church Hall from 9-18 June.

All selected images will automatically be considered for the Print section of the Western Cape Interclub competition in November this year.

# Hints to capture local birds

Seven Club members and two guests met at the Fernkloof Nature Reserve for a workshop on bird photography, at 07:00 on a cloudy morning with light rain in March.

Gavin Turner, who led the outing, addressed us on preferable camera settings for various situations, points to take into consideration when taking a bird photo, as well as the postprocessing of the images.

We proceeded to wander around the beautiful nature reserve in search of birds. We managed to spot a few, but unfortunately, due to

Despite the weather and the scarcity of birds, we all left having learnt a lot about the challenges of bird photography, and were inspired to improve on our skills.

As birds are generally social creatures, we made a point of practising our social skills, with much bantering and discussions amongst ourselves. And we ended with an increased respect for a good bird photograph.

## Aus Namibia workshop

The 2017 Aus workshop by Wicus Leeuwner and JJ van Heerden will be presented at Klein-Aus Vista, a lodge in a private nature reserve on the edge of the escarpment overlooking the Namib-Naukluft and Sperrgebiett National Parks, from 21 to 27 May.

The workshop will include photographing wild horses, wildlife (birds and mammals), the ghost town of Kolmanskop, the rugged shoreline of Lüderitz, and some night photography.

Club members qualify for a 5% discount on the costs of R15,550 per person sharing, and R16,820 for a single room.
